Course description

There are more than 7000 languages spoken in the world, each with unique features and history. This introductory course explores the diversity of human language. We will travel the world through language families and learn how linguists determine their family trees. We will explore the effects of language contact and language death.

After the course, students should (ideally):

- ... use and understand basic linguistic terminology
- ... appreciate the diversity of human language
- ...identify language families, areas, and relations
- ... have improved data analysis and critical thinking skills
- ...know more fascinating facts about linguistics and languages than any of their (non-linguist) friends, families, or acquaintances

Office Hours

This course is a remote, online, and asynchronous class. The only structured opportunity you have to interact with me face-to-face is during office hours. If you ever want to discuss topics that you're having trouble with, random linguistic-y things you're interested in, or really anything else, this the time to do it! You can come to my office or join on Zoom (link to Zoom room is on course site). You can find resources and help using Zoom here. Outside of office hours, the best way to contact me is by email. I do my best to respond within 2 business days.

I will try to send announcements about any changes to schedule or assignments by email. They will always be put in written form on the course Canvas site. Ultimately, you are responsible to keep track of any announced changes.

Course Structure and Online Participation

The course is organized into 2-3 online modules for each week. The modules guide you through readings, videos, quizzes, and homework assignments. Each module has several comprehensive questions or mini-exercises. Unlike quizzes and exams, you can revise and resubmit your responses to these questions and exercises as many times as you like as long the module is open for submissions. *Your online participation grade is calculated from your final submission*.

You will have at least 48 hours to complete each module. Modules usually become available on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at 12:00AM and submissions close on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday at 11:59PM, respectively. No late submissions are accepted!

If you read and write at a moderate pace, pay good attention, and spend time each week on your own review sessions, then you can plan to spend about 2.5 hours on a module. If you regularly need significantly more than 3 hours to complete each module, come/zoom in and talk to me.

Textbook

The primary readings for this class come from the 3rd edition of Asya Pereltsvaig's <u>Langauges of the World</u>. Reading assignments assume you have the 3rd edition, which has been greatly improved over previous versions. So if you buy a previous edition, you should have all the information you need to pass the class but you will probably find the reading assignments less engaging or understandable.

Weekly Language Reports

Each week you will choose a language to learn about in more detail so that by the end of the class you will have discovered basic facts about the 16 languages you chose, plus at least 4 other languages that were chosen by other students. Your knowledge will be tested on the exams. Detailed instructions for this assignment are provided on the course site.

Homeworks

The homeworks assignments usually focus on material covered in the previous two weeks. You have 1 week to complete each homework assignment. If you turn in late homework, you will be deducted one letter grade (10%) for each 24-hour period after the deadline. Deadlines are strict!

Quizzes and Exams

There is a online quiz almost every week to test your mastery of the week's materials and prepare you for the exams.

There are two exams. Both are open book and online but they are timed so as to make it difficult to use class materials during the exam. The midterm covers material from the first half of the semester. The final exam focuses on material from the second half of the semester, but assumes mastery of concepts covered in the first half.
