Required Textbook: Pereltsvaig, Asya. Languages of the World, 4th. ed.

Travel around the world of language and explore all the languages humans speak! This course surveys the 7000+ world languages. We discover the difference between language and dialects, what makes languages similar or difference, and learn how culture and politics affects how we communicate and what we call ourselves. We will gain a better understanding how human language helps understand human brains.

After the course, students should (ideally):

- ... appreciate the diversity of human language
- ... identify major language families and their characteristics
- ... understand basic linguistic terminology and concepts
- ... know more fascinating facts about language than their friends or family
