Course Description

This course is an introduction to linguistics, the scientific study of language. To understand what language is, we will examine a number of topics, including.

- Phonetics: The study of speech sounds (consonants, vowels, pitch)
- Phonology: The study of sound interaction (rules governing the mental representation of speech sounds).
- Morphology: The study of word-formation (how meaningful units interact).
- Syntax: The study of sentence structure (how words are 'strung' together to form sentences).
- Semantics: How expressions convey meaning.
- Pragmatics (the study of the relationship between language and context).
- Applied linguistics (the application of the knowledge gained in the study of linguistics).

Course objectives

At the end of this course, you should understand what linguists' study, how they approach this study and the relevance of the study of language to society.

Assignment Descriptions

Exams: There are three exams for this course. The exams are closed-book, closed-note. All three exams will be given in class, and you will have the entire class period to complete the exams. If you do not have an excused absence on the date that an exam is given, you will not be allowed to make it up. If you have an excused absence on the date, you will need to schedule a time to make it up.

Quizzes: The quizzes are designed to help engage you in the class materials. There are five quizzes, and they are meant to be short and quick comprehension checks. Quizzes will be posted on Canvas and students will have one day to complete them. All five quizzes will be multiple choice. You can use your notes to complete the quizzes.

Homework: There are eight homework assignments for this course. You may use your notes, textbook, and lecture slides to help you complete the homework. You may work with other students on the homework assignments, but each student must turn in their own work, and each

submitted assignment will be graded separately. Late work will not be accepted unless there is a documented emergency and prior arrangements have been made. If, for any reason, you are expecting a delay in submitting your homework, please contact me immediately, and I will provide you with an extension if necessary. Homework assignments must be typed and submitted on Canvas.

Life of A Linguist: Who is a linguist? For this assignment, you are required to discuss your perceptions of linguistics/linguists prior to your enrollment in this class and how these have changed following what you have learnt. Your submission should be ~2 pages long. Reach out to me via email/office hours if you have any questions.

Class Attendance: Class attendance is crucial to success in this class. This class is designed to introduce almost every topic in the field of Linguistics hence missing one class could lead to missing an entire area of linguistics. It is also very important for you to attend the class on time and to not disturb your peer's attention.

Experiencing Linguistics: Choose a Ted Talk related to Linguistics/Languages or listen to one episode from the linguistics podcasts such as The Vocal Fries or Lingthusiasm (<u>https://vocalfriespod.fireside.fm/</u>, <u>https://lingthusiasm.com/</u>). After listening to one of these podcast episodes or a TedTalk, you have to summarize what you learned. Your summary should not be longer than a page. It should be double-spaced, and it should not have a font size smaller than 12. To receive all 5% credits you need to submit 2 summaries (each summary = 2.5 %).
