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Course Description. This course is an introduction to linguistics, the scientific study of language. In order to understand what language is, we will examine a number of topics, including: the sound system of language (phonetics and phonology); the structure of words and sentences (morphology and syntax); the meaning of words and sentences (semantics); how language is produced and understood (psycho- and neurolinguistics); how children learn language (language acquisition); and how languages differ over time and situations, etc.

Course objectives. By the end of this course, you should understand what linguists study and have a good understanding of the core concepts in each of the above topics.

Exams. There will be 3 exams. Each exam counts towards 15% of your final grade. Honorlock will proctor your exams this semester. Honorlock is an online proctoring service that allows you to take your exam from the comfort of your home. You DO NOT need to create an account, download software or schedule an appointment in advance. Honorlock is available 24/7 and all that is needed is a computer, a working webcam, and a stable Internet connection. To get started, you will need Google Chrome and to download the Honorlock Chrome Extension. You can download the extension at www.honorlock.com/extension/install. When you are ready to test, log into Canvas, go to your course, and click on your exam. Clicking "Launch Proctoring" will begin the Honorlock authentication process, where you will take a picture of yourself, show your ID, and complete a scan of your room. Honorlock will be recording your exam session by webcam as well as recording your screen. Honorlock also has an integrity algorithm that can detect search-engine use, so please do not attempt to search for answers, even if it's on a secondary device. Quizzes. There are 7 quizzes that you take on Canvas. Each quiz counts towards 6% of your final grade.

Discussion. There are 3 discussions that you need to participant in on Canvas. Each discussion counts towards 3% of your final grade.

Research Participation/Talk Attendance. You will choose one of the following options to get credit of 4% towards your final grade:

- a) Participation in a research experiment: you can participate in **ONE** research experiment conducted on campus during the Fall 2022 semester. The faculty member in charge of the research experiment should confirm your participation in an email to your instructor Yihan Chen (Yihan.chen@ufl.edu). Proof of participation has to be submitted to Yihan Chen by **9 December 5pm**.
- b) Talk/seminar attendance: you can attend **TWO** language-related lectures in the Department of Linguistics, World Languages and Literatures, Speech and Hearing Sciences, etc. (Guest lectures offered during the regular class hours are not included). Proof of attendance has to be submitted to Yihan Chen by **9 December 5pm**.

Submit Work on Time. Time management is one of the most essential skills you need to develop during college. This includes planning your work-life balance so that you can meet all your deadlines. Every assignment in this course has a deadline that you will need to meet. However, I understand that "life happens". Because of this, late work (excluding exams) will be accepted with a small penalty of 10% of the grade for each day it is late for up to three days. Extensions (without penalty) are possible in the event of circumstances out of your control (e.g. sickness) that you can provide documentation for (e.g. doctor's note). If you miss an exam, you will need to contact me to set-up a make-up time and provide documentation. Missed exams without a documented excuse cannot be made up.

Attendance and Participation. Attendance is mandatory for the lectures. You are allowed to miss up to three 50-minute class periods without any excuse. Each further unexcused absence will lower your grade by one level (e.g. from an A to A-).
