Course Description

In this course, we will explore the following two questions:

“What is the nature of human language?”

“How can we as linguists understand the nature of human language?”

In doing so, the goal of the course is to provide a broad overview of the different fields of linguistics and the ways in which linguists analyze human language phenomena (H).

Course Assignments

To accomplish the objectives of this course, we will complete the following tasks: weekly reading, quizzes, and exams.

Quizzes (40% of Final Grade)

For every one to two weeks, you are expected to complete an open-book quiz on Canvas. These quizzes are designed as occasions to reinforce what you learn in class. There will be ten quizzes in total.

Midterm and Final Exams (60% of Final Grade)

There will be three exams, each counting as 20% of the Final Grade. They all consist of problems similar in content and format to those on quizzes.
