Course Description: This course is an overview and introduction to the field of linguistics. Linguistics is the scientific study of human language and how it works. This course will provide an introduction to linguistics and its various subfields including phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics and psycholinguistics. After this course, the student should have the knowledge necessary to continue taking other linguistics courses including the subsequent courses, Sounds of Human Language (LIN3201) and Structure of Human Language (LIN3460). The following topics will be covered in this course (subject to change if necessary, especially for the later topics).

- What is Linguistics: How is linguistics defined?
- **Phonetics**: Study of sounds of human language from acoustic perspective
- **Phonology**: Study of the sounds of human language from a mental representation perspective
- UNIT 2
- Morphology: Study of words and their structure
- Syntax: Study of sentence structure
- UNIT 3
- Semantics: Study of word meaning
- **Pragmatics**: Study of language use in context
- Sociolinguistics: Study of language and its social connections
- UNIT 4
- **Psycholinguistics**: Study of language processes in the brain
- Animal Communication vs. Human Language: Do they differ and if so, how?
- **Historical Linguistics**: Study of historical processes affecting language. Also studies extinct languages.

Course Objectives: The goal of the course is to provide an introduction and overview of the field of linguistics as a whole. In order to do this, the core subfields of linguistics will be introduced during the course with a discussion of some of their fundamental parts. Thus, the student should gain a basic knowledge of the core subfields of linguistics and what they study as well as being familiar with some of the core principles and concepts of these subfields. This course serves as the preparatory course for other linguistics courses that build on this fundamental knowledge. The course will not be able to discuss every subfield of linguistics, but the core subfields as well as some others will be discussed.

Course Grading:

The final grade for the course will come from the following assignments:

Exams: 4 x 12% = 48% Homework: 7 x 6% = 42% Online Quizzes: 5 x 2% = 10%

Exams: There will be 4 exams throughout the course, corresponding to each unit. The course is divided into four units and thus there will be an exam immediately following each unit. The exams are not cumulative, and each will cover the material for that unit. There is no final exam. The fourth exam will simply cover the fourth unit.

Homework: There will be 7 homework assignments throughout the course. They will correspond to some of the subfields that are discussed. The assignments will be provided on Canvas and should be typed and submitted on Canvas. Students may discuss the homework with each other, but every student must write up their answers entirely on their own and in their own wording.

Quizzes: There will be 5 short online quizzes that will be available on Canvas. These quizzes will be primarily in the first half of the semester. They will cover topics covered in class and will be multiple choice. They will be timed, however the time allotted will be generous and so time should not be a major factor.

Course materials: We will use the Language Files book for this class. It should be the 12th edition.

Course Policies:

Technology: Students are more than welcome to take notes on their laptops if they wish. Students should make sure their phones are on silent during the class time. If a student needs to text or use their phone during class, they should do so in a way that does not disturb other students.

Make-up Work: If a student will need to make up an exam, they must notify the instructor prior to the exam in order to schedule a make-up exam. Make-up exams should only be for documented medical reasons, university obligations (e.g a university scheduled trip) or other unavoidable reasons (e.g jury duty). Any other reasons will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.

Late work: Quizzes or homeworks that are turned in late will receive a 5% deduction from the grade unless there is a documented, legitimate reason for a late submission. Any homework (or quiz) that is not turned in will receive a grade of 0.
