Course Description

The goal of this course is to provide an introduction to the field of linguistics (the scientific study of language) as well as the methodologies/approaches taken by linguistics to analyze language. During this course, we will examine some of the key areas of linguistics, including phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, language variation, and language acquisition.

- Demonstrate an understanding of the core areas of linguistics
- Analyze a range of language structures at different levels of complexity
- Use basic linguistic terminology to describe the features of human languages
