Overview:

Humans use a wide variety of sounds in producing language. This course enables the student to recognize the sounds of human languages, to understand how they are made, and to identify the physical properties that correspond to them. We study the patterning and function of sounds in languages of the world, doing in-class research on an unfamiliar language to apply the methods of analyzing a language's sound system.

Prerequisite: Lin 3010 (Introduction to Linguistics)

Objectives: On completion of this course, students should be able to:

- accurately transcribe speech from an unfamiliar language or dialect
- describe the articulatory processes involved in producing speech sounds
- perform a phonemic analysis on phonetic data
- recognize and label common phonological processes
- appreciate similarities among phonetic/phonological systems of languages

Smalley Transcription (8%): The Smalley assignments, listed by number on your schedule, are due by Thursdays' classes. Each week's assignment is worth ½ point. Details on how to complete the assignments, including further instructions, copies of the assignments, answer keys in IPA, and a general conversion guide from Smalley's transcription system to the IPA can be found on the eLearning site for this course. After recording your answers while listening to the tapes, compare your answers to the answer sheet and note any problems. Turn in your transcriptions and notes about problems.

Attendance & Classroom Participation (7%): in most classes, time permitting, 10-15 minutes will be spent on exercises, either individual or group-oriented. These practice exercise sessions will reinforce your ability to perceive and to produce the different sounds, and attendance will not only be reflected in your participation grade, but also in your success in the quizzes and field work project. Your attendance and your participation in these exercises contributes 7% to your final grade. Regular class attendance is crucial, and will count towards your grade as follows (and note that missing a Thursday (2-hour) class counts as missing 2 Class-Hours):

Homeworks (30%): Homework assignments are due on Thursdays; each is worth 6% of your grade. They ask you to use terms, methods, or information presented in class. You are free to work with fellow students on these assignments, but you must write up the answers on your own.

Quizzes (30%): Quizzes take place at the beginning of class on Thursdays. Each quiz will be worth 6% of your grade, and will take no more than 15 minutes. Each will involve transcription of examples provided by Dr. Wiltshire or prerecorded, followed by questions on the material covered during the preceding weeks.

Fieldwork Project (15%): In weeks 13-14 of class, a native speaker of a language which no one in the class has studied will join us so that you can practice "field methods" on the language. You will interact with the speaker to determine the sound system (phones and phonemes) of his/her language, and you will write up the results for the last class 12/03.

Perception Quiz (5%): Administered at the beginning of the final class session 12/03 Tuesday. You will be asked to identify or discriminate sounds presented to you via the computer. The sounds to be used will be selected from either Smalley's exercises or the exercises available through my web page. The quiz will take approximately 10-15 minutes.

Production Quiz (5%): Administered during the final class sessions: Tuesday 11/26 and Tuesday 12/03 (after the perception quiz), I will meet with each of you for 5 minutes and ask you to produce various sounds by reading from the IPA transcription. You will sign up for a time slot in advance (either for a Tuesday class, or an office hour time if you prefer).

Policy on working together: You are welcome to work together on homework assignments, but you should write up your answers independently from each other. No collaboration of any kind is allowed on the quizzes, etc. Remember you are bound by the UF honor pledge: "We, the members of the University of Florida community, pledge to hold ourselves and our peers to the highest standards of honesty and integrity by abiding by the Honor Code.
