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Course Description:

This course is designed to help you acquire a deeper understanding of the Modern English grammar and the terminology pertaining to it. It will assist you in developing an awareness of the interconnectivity of the form/structure, meaning, and use of various grammatical features of the English language. We will examine the prescriptive rules of the English grammar, but also bring awareness to the actual ways speakers of English use the language, i.e. the descriptive rules of English, as well as the way prescriptive and descriptive rules can deviate from each other.

Simultaneously, we will be working on developing a pedagogical perspective on different ways these grammatical features can be taught to learners of English. This will be accomplished by examining modern pedagogical approaches to teaching English as a second/foreign language and developing teaching materials.

Course Objectives: By the end of this course you will have acquired the ability to competently describe and explain the phenomena of basic English grammar, such as the characteristics of different word classes and sentence structure types. We will focus on grammar points which learners of English as a second/foreign language often find challenging, such as verb tense and aspect, modal verbs, phrasal verbs, etc. You will also have obtained a broad theoretical knowledge of contemporary language teaching methods, with a focus on Task-Based Language Teaching (TBLT). Apart from the theoretical knowledge, you will have gained experience in creating teaching materials, including task sequences/units, authentic grammar resources, and lesson plans.

Homework Assignments: You will submit 5 written homework assignments (each counting as 7% towards your final grade) over the course of the semester. Three assignments, 1, 2, and 5, will require you to complete a grammar exercise demonstrating your knowledge of previously covered grammar structures. The remaining assignments, 3 and 4, will require you to create teaching materials: e.g. a task sequence adopting the TBLT framework designed to cover a particular grammar topic, an adaptation of an authentic text as a grammar resource, etc. Specific details and instructions will be posted on Canvas at least a week prior to the deadline. The homework assignments are due on the dates listed on the schedule below as hard copies in class before class starts. Typed documents are strongly encouraged. Late submissions will not be accepted.

In-class Teaching Demonstration and Observation: As a member of a group, you will develop a 35-minute instructional unit on a specific grammar point. You will teach this instructional unit to your peers in class. The instructional unit can be based on TBLT principles, yet other methodologies are welcome as long as they are specified. Your group members will assess your performance in writing using a feedback sheet provided by the instructor. Your group peers' averaged assessments will count as 5% towards your final grade; the instructor's independent assessment of your performance will count as 10% towards your final grade; your observational comments on a demonstration of your choosing will count as 5% of your final grade.

Midterm and Final Exam: The midterm exam is scheduled for Friday, 3/2. The final exam is scheduled for the last day of classes, regular classroom and meeting time. There are no make-up exams. If you have an excused absence the day of the exam, please contact the instructor.
