Course Description:

This course is designed to help you acquire the terminology pertaining to the grammar of Modern English and develop an awareness of the form/structure, meaning, and use of various grammatical features of the English language. Simultaneously, we will be working on developing a pedagogical perspective on different ways these grammatical features can be taught to learners of English. This will be accomplished by examining modern pedagogical approaches to teaching English as a second/foreign language and developing teaching materials.

Course Objectives: By the end of this course you will have acquired the ability to competently describe and explain the phenomena of basic English grammar, such as the characteristics of different word classes and sentence structure types. We will focus on grammar points which learners of English as a second/foreign language often find challenging, such as verb tense and aspect, modal verbs, phrasal verbs, etc. You will also have obtained a broad theoretical knowledge of different language teaching methods, with a focus on Task-Based Teaching (TBT). Apart from the theoretical knowledge, you will have gained experience in creating teaching materials, including task sequences/units, authentic grammar resources, and lesson plans.

Attendance and Participation: Attendance is mandatory. You are allowed three unexcused absences. Each additional unexcused absence will lower your grade by one letter (e.g. from an A to A-).

Homework Assignments: You will submit 5 written homework assignments (each counting as 7% towards your final grade) over the course of the semester. Three assignments, 1, 2, and 5, will require you to complete a grammar exercise demonstrating your knowledge of previously covered grammar structures. The other assignments, 3 and 4, will require you to create teaching materials: a task sequence adopting the TBT framework designed to cover a particular grammar topic, and an adaptation of an authentic text as a grammar resource. Specific details and instructions will be posted on Canvas at least a week prior to the deadline. The homework



assignments are due on the dates listed on the schedule below as hard copies in class before class starts. Typed documents are strongly encouraged. Late submissions will not be accepted.

Grammar Class Practice: As a member of a group, you will develop a 30-minute instructional unit on a specific grammar point. You will teach this instructional unit to your peers in class. The instructional unit can be based on TBT principles, yet other methodologies are welcome as long as they are specified. Your group members will assess your performance in writing using a feedback sheet provided by the instructor. Your peers' assessments will count as 10% towards your final grade; the instructor's independent assessment of your performance will count as 10% towards your final grade.

Midterm and Final Exam: The midterm exam is scheduled for October 9th during the regular class time in Anderson 21. The final exam is scheduled for December 14th from 10am - 12pm in Anderson 21. There are no make-up exams. If you have an excused absence the day of the exam please contact the instructor. Please contact the instructor by September 19th if you have a scheduling conflict with the final exam date.
