Course Description: In this class, we will familiarize ourselves with key concepts, theories, and empirical research on child and adult second language acquisition (SLA).

Course objectives: By the end of this course you will have acquired the ability to intelligently discuss aspects of the theory and practice of language learning based on knowledge of the scholarly research in the field. You will also have learned how to analyze learner data both for research purposes and to inform ESL teaching practice.

Exams: There are three multiple choice exams. All three exams are closed book and closed notes and take place in class. Please see the course schedule below for the dates of exams.

BBC Series Discussion Questions: In week 2 of the semester, you will watch a BBC documentary on language acquisition and answer a few discussion questions in writing. This assignment must be submitted on CANVAS by the due date listed in the course schedule below.

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My L2 Buddy Assignments: You will be asked to find a partner outside of class who is a second language learner of English (i.e., your L2 Buddy). You will meet with that person to learn about their language their first language background and their experience with learning English. Your will record your L2 Buddy on two occasions, and ask him/her to provide a short written sample. You will transcribe (at least part of) the recordings, and you will analyze their oral and written production and submit analyses (three total). At the end of the semester, you will submit a reflection on what you have learned from your L2 Buddy. All assignments related to working with your L2 Buddy (see above for a breakdown in percent towards the overall course grade, and see CANVAS for detailed descriptions of each assignment) will be due on CANVAS by the due date listed in the course schedule below.
