**Course Description.** In this class, we will familiarize ourselves with key methods of corpus linguistics for research and teaching.

**Course objectives:** By the end of this course, you will have acquired competence in using concordance software to browse and query corpora; you will also have acquired a basic understanding of how corpora are compiled and annotated; you will be able to run some basic statistics that are commonly used in corpus-based research; and you will have theoretical and practical knowledge of how to use corpora for language teaching.

**Article summaries.** You are responsible for 2 article summaries. All articles are available on CANVAS. Each article summary should end with at least three critical questions pertaining to either the methods, theory, or conclusions of the article. Article summaries should be between 2—3 pages long (excluding any cover page and references; double—spaced; 12—point Times New Roman; 1—inch margins throughout). Article summaries must be submitted on CANVAS by 10am on the due dates listed on the schedule below.

**Research Spotlight Presentations.** In groups of two or more students, you will select a (pair of) words, phrase, or (a pair of) construction(s) in a language (or languages) of your choice and present a “corpus profile” for it. A corpus profile is a maximally comprehensive description of the linguistic entity at hand, using the corpus tools that you will have learned how to use at that point. You can focus on any aspect of the linguistic entity you chose to examine: what it means; how it is used by different speakers, in different genres, or registers; how it has developed over time; how its translation equivalents are used differently across languages; etc. You will present your corpus profile (including (i) a motivation for your choice; (ii) a description of the tools you used, and (iii) the main results of your exploration) in a 5-minute presentation in class.

**Grading Scale.** Your total score determines your final grade on this grading scale:
