COURSE DESCRIPTION AND GOALS:

The purpose of this course is to increase your understanding of the role of language in social interaction and the construction of identity, and to heighten your awareness of language choices and their consequences. Topics include different approaches to the study of language in social interaction (theories and research methodologies), ways in which language is used to construct social identity (e.g. race, gender, status), and issues concerning language and culture (e.g. code-switching and stance). In addition to providing a conceptual framework with which to think about language and interaction, this course will provide experience in observing and analyzing how verbal and nonverbal conduct are enacted and understood in social situations.

COURSE PREREQUISITES: None (Note: However, it is helpful if you've taken *Language & Power* in the fall or *Sociolinguistics*. Also, this is not a good course for you if you are a Freshman. It is geared more towards advanced undergraduates).

ATTENDANCE & PARTICIPATION:

Your attendance and participation in class is significant to your success in the class. Attendance will be taken daily. It is <u>your</u> responsibility to look for and be sure you have signed the roll sheet by the end of class. <u>If you have not signed the roll sheet, you will be counted as absent.</u> If you come to class unprepared, you may be asked to leave and counted as absent for that class period.

NOTE: In the case of class being canceled, you will likely be given an assignment to do instead. In order to receive credit for your attendance/participation grade for that day, you must submit that assign by Midnight on Canvas on the day it is due. Always check your email before class for updates from me.

How absences affect your grade:

You are allowed 3 absences (3 hours) for whatever reason, so it is not necessary to explain why you missed class. However, you do not get extra sick days excused if you used the 3 hours for visiting people, vacation, studying for an exam, etc. Therefore, use your 3 hours wisely. If you have university business (e.g. athletics, conference), you must provide documentation from the official UF organization you are representing. If you are hospitalized and expect that to exceed your 3 hours of class, you must also provide documentation that shows you had to use up your 3 absences and then some. Here is the point deduction for absences over 3 hours:

• 4th absence = automatic minus 20 points from attendance/participation (A/P) grade, 5th absence another 20 points deducted from the A/P grade; and so on for all absences after 3. Once all participation points are used up, points will be deducted from your final grade.

IT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY TO SIGN IN FOR EVERY CLASS YOU ATTEND!

How tardiness affects your grade: Again, your presence impacts your ability to integrate and contribute to the discussion. Excessive tardiness or leaving early will therefore affect your grade. You must be in class at least 40 minutes for each 50-minute segment to get credit for that 50-minute block. Three (3) tardies (entering late or leaving early) will count as one absence as described above. If you ask permission to leave early to study for an exam or other, I will always say yes, but you will still be considered 'leaving early' and receive a 1/3 absence. You are accountable for your choices, so I will always accept your right to choose what is best for you, but will also uphold a standard across the board for all students. It is not fair to those that come to class on time and forego preparation for other classes, to excuse some students.

Missing and making up an assignment: I do <u>not</u> accept assignments that are turned in late without prior approval by me. Prior approval means *before* the due date and not on or after it is due. Do not try to turn in an assignment late and hope for partial credit. I do not accept late assignments.

Exams

Exams 1 & 2 will be given in class and will cover material from Chapters 1-7 and 8-12, respectively. They will be composed of definitions, multiple-choice questions, matching, and an essay.

Final Project

For your final project, you (or you and a partner) will analyze a piece of discourse (written or oral/visual) to illustrate some principle we learned in the class regarding talk and identities. Examples of topics could include *genre*, *membership categorization*, *speech acts*, *preference structure*, *stance*, *code-switching*, *language styles*, as a means to explore how we construct identities. If you choose spoken discourse, it is expected that you will transcribe it (with line numbers), or find a transcription of it, and provide a key of transcription conventions. You have a lot of latitude, but the topic must be approved by me in advance.

You then have a choice whether you would like to do a final paper or PPT presentation to illustrate your analysis. The amount of time given for the presentation will vary depending on how many students choose this option, but it will likely be between 10-15 min. If you choose to write the paper instead, it should be between 6-10 pages (double-spaced) that gives some background on what you analyzed, methods of analysis, results, and some implications/discussion of what you found. <u>Dress code</u> on presentation day is business casual (e.g. no jeans, shorts, t-shirts, tank tops, PJs, etc.).

Extra Credit

I will use some of the questions for each exam based on questions you have submitted. For extra credit, create 20 questions & answers, using ONLY multiple choice (with 4 options) and T/F types of questions. Indicate the answers below each question. (Note: Separate and label questions by chapter.) You may choose to submit questions for Exam 1 or Exam 2, but NOT both.

Extra credit is always due 1 week prior to the exam on CANVAS (no exceptions & no late submissions). This assignment is worth up to 10 points added to your total point score for the course.

Additionally, I am always looking for real-world examples of language use in articles, video clips, etc. to use in class to demonstrate a particular theme. You may email me examples at any time that you find that you think will be interesting to the rest of the class, and if I use it, you will receive 5 extra credit points. You may earn a maximum of 10 extra credit points this way.
