#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION AND GOALS:**

The purpose of this course is to increase your understanding of the role of language in social interaction and the construction of identity, and to heighten your awareness of language choices and their consequences. Topics include different approaches to the study of language in social interaction (theories and research methodologies), ways in which language is used to construct social identity (e.g. race, gender, status), and issues concerning language and culture (e.g. code-switching and stance). In addition to providing a conceptual framework with which to think about language and interaction, this course will provide experience in observing and analyzing how verbal and nonverbal conduct are enacted and understood in social situations.

#### **COURSE PREREQUISITES:**

None (However, it is helpful if you've taken *Language & Power* in the fall or *Sociolinguistics*. Also, this course is not for Freshmen or Sophomores. It is geared towards advanced undergraduates).

#### ATTENDANCE & PARTICIPATION:

\*Note: University attendance policy regarding illness due to CoVid-19 exposure is evolving. I will relay to you any important changes as soon as they become available to me, but for now, if you are exposed to Covid, you should not come to class. You will treat it as any other illness, which is why I have built in a buffer of 3 classes you can miss for any reason without penalty. Your attendance and participation in class is significant to your success in the class. Attendance will be taken daily. If you come to class unprepared, you may be asked to leave and counted as absent for that class period.

NOTE: In the rare case of class being canceled, you will likely be given an assignment to do instead. In order to receive credit for your attendance/participation grade for that day, you must submit that assign by Midnight on Canvas on the day it is due. Always check your email before class for updates from me. Your attendance and participation in class is significant to your success in the class. Attendance will be taken daily. If you come to class unprepared, you may be asked to leave and counted as absent for that class period.

How absences affect your grade: You are allowed 3 unexcused absences for whatever reason, so it is not necessary to explain why you missed class. In general, reasons for an excused absence from or failure to participate in class include serious illness or hospitalization, serious family emergencies, special curricular requirements (e.g., judging trips, field trips, professional conferences), military obligation, severe weather conditions, religious holidays, and participation in official university activities such as

music performances, athletic competition, or debate. Absences from class for court-imposed legal obligations (e.g., jury duty or subpoena) are also excused.

Here is the point deduction for absences over 3 hours: 4th absence = automatic minus 20 points from attendance/participation (A/P) grade, 5<sup>th</sup> absence another 20 points deducted from the A/P grade; and so on for all absences after 3. Once all participation points are used up, points will be deducted from your final grade.

#### How tardiness affects your grade:

If students are not on present at the start of class, this disrupts the entire class, and students will be considered late. If a student leaves class early, this will also be considered as a 'tardy.' Three instances of tardiness count as one absence. If a student is only in attendance for under 40 of the 50 minutes of class, the student will be counted as 'absent' and not just 'tardy.

"No Name": Any and all assignments that do not have your full name on each document will receive an automatic 2-point penalty.

**Late Assignments:** You are permitted to submit 1 late assignment during the semester without penalty (to be turned in no later than 24 hours after the due date in order to receive credit). Except for this one-time allowance, no assignments or make-up exams will not be accepted (*even for partial credit*) without a University-approved absence.

"Re-Do" Assignments: I do not allow students to "re-do" an assignment once it has been graded or to do an additional assignment in place of another assignment (e.g. homework, extra credit).

#### Homework

Each assignment will involve data analysis focusing on the themes learned in the chapter. Students must complete 1 from each of the 3 pairs of HW assignments throughout the semester for a total of 3 submissions.

## **Reaction Papers**

On Canvas, I provide an array of articles relevant to each chapter that you may find interesting for further reading. Students are required to write 4 reaction papers (25 pts. each) throughout the semester from the array of articles that I have posted. Reaction papers should be approximately 2-4 pages in length (double-spaced, 12-pt, Times New Roman font, 1" margins). Eligible articles will have an asterix next to them on Canvas. Reaction paper 2 is the only one on a specific topic, and it will have specific article(s) and questions you need to address in it.

In each paper, you need to accomplish 3 things for full credit: (1) summarize the main points of the article (10 pts); (2) how does the paper tie into the themes we are talking about in this chapter (10 pts); (3) explain what you liked and/or didn't like about the paper and why (5 pts). You will be expected to utilize the terminology we have learned on a given topic to talk about the article in your paper. Reaction papers are always due by midnight and will be submitted to CANVAS by the due date listed on the weekly schedule.

#### Exams

Exams 1 & 2 will be given in class and will cover material from Chapters 1-5 and 6-10, respectively. They will be composed of definitions, T/F, multiple-choice questions, and 1-2 short essays.

## **Breaching Experiment**

In this exercise, you will be split into groups of 4-5 and will go around campus studying the role of verbal communication in maintaining social order. You will work with your partners to devise "breaches" of social norms and observe their effects. You will then type up your individual observations and submit them to Canvas (3-6 pages double-spaced).

## Extra Credit

Students may earn up to 20 points of extra credit in 3 different ways in this course:

Exam Questions (10 points): You may create 20 multiple choice or T/F questions (with 4 options) for each exam. Indicate the answers below each question. (Note: Separate and label questions by chapter.) You may choose to submit questions for Exam 1 OR Exam 2, but NOT both. Extra credit is always due 1 week prior to the exam on CANVAS (no exceptions & **no** late submissions).

<u>Pop Culture Examples (5 points):</u> Second, I am always looking for real-world examples of language use in articles, video clips, etc. to use in class to demonstrate a particular theme. You may email me examples at any time that you find that you think will be interesting to the rest of the class, and <u>if</u> I use it, you will receive 5 extra credit points.

<u>Teaching Evaluations (5 points)</u>: Lastly, if <u>85%</u> of the class does the teaching evaluations towards the end of the semester, I will add 5 extra credit points to everyone's grades.
