Course Overview

The American South had some of the richest linguistic diversity of any part of the United States, and Florida was part of this diversity. Though many of the Native languages of this region are no longer spoken, we have documentation on most of them. In this course, students will learn in detail the grammar of two indigenous languages, Timucua and Muskogee (Creek), and learn and then present their knowledge on a third indigenous language chosen at the beginning of the semester.

Course Goals

In this course, students will

- a.) become familiar with the Native languages of Florida and the larger Southeastern US.
- b.) learn about regional tendencies, and
- c.) become more familiar with linguistic typology.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs)

- Understand and analyze the grammar of two indigenous language of the Florida (Creek and Timucua)
- Understand the phonological, morphological, and syntactic properties of one additional Native language, and use this knowledge to create four short presentations of a Native language of the Southeast.

Requirements

The requirements for this class are as follows

- Seven homework assignments on Muskogee (Creek) and/or Timucua grammar.
- Four brief presentations on features of the language you have chosen to focus on.
 Each presentation is about 5-10 minutes long and summarizes the data in your source material from a typological perspective.

The grade for the course is determined on the basis of the following:

- Four short presentations 60%
- Homework 25%
- Attendance 10%
- Participation 5%

Class Attendance (10 points) From the start everybody will have 100 points of class attendance. Each unexcused non-attendance of a class will be penalized by subtracting 10 points from this score. The final score will count 10 per cent of the final grade. Only excused absences arranged ahead of time with the professor or documented emergencies will be exempted.
